







Introducing the McKinney-Vento Act

Student Outcomes




School Transfers are associated with:

- Academic Outcomes
 - O Lower test scores
 - More likely to repeat a grade
 - O Higher drop-out rate
- Social/Emotional Outcomes
 - O Loss of supportive relationships
 - Decreased engagement (high absenteeism)
 - Increase in negative behaviors and disciplinary actions

The McKinney-Vento Act Provides School Stability

- Federal law: McKinney-Vento Act
- Enacted in 1987
- Reauthorized in 2015 as part of ESSA



Risk Factors for Homelessness



At a Glance: Homelessness and Systemic Racism

RACE AND HOMELESSNESS Racial minorities experience homelessness in greater numbers and for longer durations. **DISPROPORTIONATE REPRESENTATION** 13% of the U.S. population is African American 40% of the homeless population is African American *Even when controlling for poverty, African Americans are dramatically more likely than whites to become homeless. (Carter, 2011)

The intersection of racism and homelessness is too often overlooked and unacknowledged. Yet, until we open our eyes to it, we will never be able to end homelessness.

At a Glance: Homelessness and LGBTQ Youth

Youth identifying as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer/questioning (LGBTQ) have a 120 percent higher risk of reporting homelessness compared to youth who identified as heterosexual and cisgender ¹

Why might this be? Some factors include:

- Higher rates of family violence and rejection.
- Bullying in school and limited social support networks.
- Social services available may be hostile or discriminatory.²

McKinney-Vento Liaisons

All LEAs, including charter schools, must designate a McKinney-Vento Liaison.

- Local liaisons must be able to carry out the duties listed in the McKinney-Vento Act.

McKinney-Vento Liaison Responsibilities

- Conduct outreach and identify students
- 2. Enroll students
- 3. Provide access to educational services, including preschool
- 4. Make referrals
- 5. Provide information to parents about educational opportunities for children

- 6. Post public notice
- 7. Mediate disputes
- 8. Share information about transportation services
- 9. Provide professional development to school staff
- 10.Enroll and serve unaccompanied youth, prepare such students for college

McKinney-Vento Eligibility & Identification

Who is covered by the McKinney-Vento Act?

Education Law §3209(1)(a); 8 NYCRR §100.2(x)(1); see also 42 USC §11434A(2)(B)(i); U.S. DOE's Non-Regulatory Guidance, Question A-2,

Children and youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, including those:

- Sharing the housing of others due to loss of housing, economic hardship or a similar reason
- Living in emergency or transitional shelters
- Living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations
- Abandoned in hospitals
- Living in a public or private place not designed for sleeping
- Living in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, etc.
- Migratory living in circumstances described above

Spotlight on Homeless Unaccompanied Youth

- ✓ Youth who meet the definition of homelessness using McKinney-Vento criteria (lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence) + are not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian.
 - ✓ Any school-age child or youth can be an unaccompanied youth.
- ✓ In 2017-18, about 7% of identified homeless students in New York were homeless unaccompanied youth.



Additional Identification Strategies

Avoid using the word "homeless"

Provide awareness activities

Post outreach materials

Coordinate with community service agencies

Coordinate with youth-serving agencies

Use available data

Dispute Resolution Requirements

If a dispute arises over eligibility, school selection or enrollment, the child or youth must be immediately enrolled in the school in which the parent, guardian or unaccompanied youth seeks enrollment, pending **resolution of the dispute, including all available appeals**.

- Immediately admit student to the school/district where enrollment is sought;
- **OProvide transportation**;
- OGive the parent/guardian/youth a written explanation of the school's decision; and
- Refer the student to the LEA liaison for help with any appeal.

Criteria for Charter School Admissions

McKinney-Vento-eligible students:

- OAre subject to the same admissions criteria as permanently housed students, if any, for admission to a charter school.
- OCan transfer mid-year to a charter school, if permanently housed students may do so.



Liaison Must Facilitate Enrollment

Under McKinney-Vento, selected school must immediately enroll:

- O Even if the child/youth does not have records normally needed for enrollment; or
- O Child/youth has **missed application** or enrollment
 deadlines during any period of
 homelessness.

Lotteries: If a student in temporary housing seeks enrollment in a charter school and the lottery application deadline has passed but the lottery hasn't been held yet, the student should be entered into the lottery.

O If the lottery has been held, the student should be placed on the school waitlist, if one exists.

Charter School Lotteries – Geographic Preference

Geographic preference for charter school admissions lotteries is available to students in temporary housing for:

A. Any charter school located in the school district where the student was last permanently housed (School District of Origin),

AND ALSO

B. Any charter school located in the school district where the student is temporarily residing (School District of Current Location).

Designation Form: STAC 202

In addition to school selection, families or unaccompanied youth must choose a designated district of attendance.



Designation Form: STAC 202

- For charter schools, an underlying Designated School District of Attendance must be chosen by the parent or youth.
 - School District of Current Location can use form to initiate reimbursement process if it is designated.
- For Students Placed in Housing by DSS:

DSS must ensure that the STAC form is completed and sent to the designated school district.



District of Attendance: Responsibilities

- Payment of tuition
- Committee on Special Education (CSE)
- Transportation*
- *Designated school district not responsible for transportation if:
 - School district is not in session (charter must arrange transportation).
 - O DSS is responsible

Transportation for Students in Temporary Housing

- Students experiencing homelessness who attend charter schools usually receive transportation from their designated school district.
- Students who move into permanent housing are entitled to transportation through the remainder of the school year and an additional year if it is the child's terminal grade in the school.

Includes:

- Students with individualized education programs (IEPs), including specialized transportation services
- Preschool students

Sample DSS transportation protocol

Department of social services placed the family in emergency housing outside of the school district where the student is enrolled

Title I for Students in Temporary Housing

- O An LEA's **Title I set-aside** is used to assist students in temporary housing in meeting academic standards as well as assisting with urgent needs, such as emergency supplies.
- O All students in temporary housing are eligible, regardless of whether or not they attend a Title I school.

Title I Services for Students in Temporary Housing

- Academic programs and educational support services
- Basic/emergency supplies
- Extended library hours/after school programs
- Counseling services
- Parental involvement
- Intervention programs
- Outreach efforts to identify the STH population and help them
- The work of the ligison
- Research based programs that benefit highly mobile students
- Data collection to assess the needs/progress of STH



Key Takeaways

- 1. All charter schools must appoint a McKinney-Vento Liaison to identify, enroll, and serve students experiencing homelessness.
