

Causes of Homelessness

Lack of Affordable Housing

What are the potential causes of homelessness?

Family Rejection/ Conflict

Domestic

Educational Barriers



Lack of **basic** resources like a safe and stable place to live, food, and clothing



Difficulty **accessing** school, immunization records, other documentation necessary for school enrollment, and school supplies



Challenges finding transportation to enroll with the school registration office, or to attend school daily






McKinney-Vento Act





McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act

- Federal law established in 1987
- Reauthorized in 2015 as part of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)









McKinney-Vento Students' Rights

- ✓ Free appropriate education
- ✓ Immediate enrollment
- ✓ Attend classes
- ✓ Receive transportation
- ✓ Receive educational services



Receive a free, appropriate public education



Enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment, or having missed the application or enrollment deadlines during any period of homelessness



Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents



Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if requested by the parent or guardian, or by the local liaison on behalf of an unaccompanied youth



Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to each student's need





McKinney-Vento Act: Definition of Homeless





McKinney-Vento Act Defines Homelessness

The term "homeless child or youth" means individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate primary nighttime residence.

Fixed (attached to the ground)

Permanent Housing

Regular

(can go there every night, come and go as they please, etc.)

Adequate

(heat, lights, not sleeping on couch/floor, etc.)





Who is Covered Under McKinney-Vento?

Children and youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, including those:

- Sharing the housing of others due to loss of housing, economic hardship or a similar reason;
- Living in emergency or transitional shelters;
- Living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations;
- Abandoned in hospitals;
- Living in a public or private place not designed for sleeping;
- Living in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, etc.;
- Migratory children living in circumstances described above;
- Unaccompanied youth living in circumstances described above.







Definition of an Unaccompanied Homeless Youth

An unaccompanied youth is a child or youth that is not in the physical custody of/not living with a parent or guardian.

To be eligible for services under the McKinney-Vento Act, the youth must also meet the definition of homeless.









McKinney-Vento Act Requires...

The McKinney-Vento Act requires that school districts designate an appropriate staff person, who also may be a coordinator for other Federal programs, as a local homeless education liaison.

The Mckinney-Vento Act requires a point person for families and district staff to assist with the identification and enrollment of students experiencing temporary housing.





42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(1)(J)(ii)

Eligibility Scenario



Mom is living with two children in a twobedroom apartment. The family loses housing, and they move into grandma's senior housing. The mom goes to register the children in grandma's school district. The District Liaison determines that the children...

Identification

Under the McKinney-Vento Act, the local liaison is charged with ensuring that homeless children and youth are "identified by school personnel through outreach and coordination activities with other entities and agencies."



42 U.S.C. § 11432 (g)(6)(A)(i)



Student Privacy Rights Under FERPA

 Strategies used by school districts to identify McKinney-Vento students should be grounded in sensitivity and demonstrate a commitment to protecting student confidentiality.

• According to the McKinney-Vento Act, information about the living situation of a child or youth experiencing homelessness is not deemed to be directory information; rather it's considered to be part of a student's education record and must be provided with the applicable confidentiality protections. (42 U.S.C. § 11432[g][3][G])

Housing Questionnaire

- Screening tool is required for all students
- Required at the time of enrollment and change of address
- It is completed by the student's parent, person in parental relation, or, in the case of an unaccompanied youth, by the student directly.

NOTE TO SCHOOLS/LEAS: Please assist students and families filling out this form. The form should be included at the top page of registration materials that the district shares with families. Do not simply include this form in the registration packet, because if the student qualifies as residing in temporary housing, the student is not required to submit proof of residency and other required documents that may be part of the registration packet. <u>Immediate Enrollment</u>

- Selected school must immediately enroll, even if the child/youth:
 - Does not have records normally needed for enrollment (Missing records, immunizations, proof of residency, guardianship papers, or a birth certificate)



- Owes past fees or fines
- Enrolling school should contact the last school attended for records
- Liaison must assist child/youth in obtaining any necessary immunizations or other required health records

STAC-202: Designation Form

Two purposes:

- 1. Official Designation form (complete for every M-V student enrolled in your district and send a copy to districts listed)
- 2. Eligibility form for homeless tuition reimbursement

If DSS places a child or youth in a temporary housing facility or RHY facility, DSS must complete the designation form within two days and submit it to the designated school district.

Education Law §3209(2)(e); 8 NYCRR §100.2(x)(3)(i)(b)

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School Selection

Local education agencies (LEAs or school districts) must "presume that keeping homeless children and youth in the school of origin is in the child's or youth's best interest, to the extent feasible, except when doing so is contrary to the wishes of the parent or guardian (or in the case of an unaccompanied homeless youth) the youth;"





42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(B)(i), 2001

School Selection: School of Origin

School districts must keep children and youth experiencing homelessness in the school of origin, to the extent feasible, except when doing so is contrary to the wishes of the parent or guardian (or in the case of an unaccompanied homeless youth, against the youth's wishes) (42 U.S.C. § 11432[g][3][B][i]).

- School of origin is defined as the school that the child or youth attended when permanently housed or the school in which the child or youth was last enrolled (42 U.S.C. § 11432[g][3][G]).
- Students can continue attending their school of origin the entire time they are homeless and until the end of any academic year in which they become permanently housed (42 U.S.C. § 11432[g][3][A][i][II]).
- If a student becomes homeless in between academic years, he or she can continue attending the school of origin for the following school year (42 U.S.C. § 11432[g][3][A][i][l]).





McKinney-Vento Act: School Selection

Parents, guardians, or unaccompanied youth (the designator) in temporary housing may have choices for school enrollment.

They can choose:

- The school attended or were entitled to attend when circumstances arose which caused the child or youth to become homeless;
- The school last enrolled, even if the student was temporarily housed during that time; or
- The local school where the student is currently temporarily housed.

N.Y. Education Law § 3209(1)(c)





Best Interest Determination

In determining what is in the best interest of the child or youth, the local educational agency (LEA) shall –

- Keep a homeless child or youth in the school of origin, except when doing so is contrary to the wishes of the child's or youth's parent or guardian;
- Provide a written explanation, including a statement regarding the right to appeal, to the homeless child's or youth's parent or guardian, if the local educational agency sends such child or youth to a school other than the school of origin or a school requested by the parent or guardian;
- Ensure that the homeless liaison assists the unaccompanied homeless youth in placement or enrollment decisions and provides notice to such youth of the right to appeal.









Transportation

The McKinney-Vento Act states that "(iii) The State and the local educational agencies in the State will adopt policies and practices to ensure that transportation is provided, at the request of the parent or guardian (or in the case of an unaccompanied youth, the liaison), to and from the school of origin."





McKinney-Vento Act & N.Y. Education Law § 3209: Transportation



Students experiencing homelessness, including preschoolers, are entitled to transportation to the school of origin.





Students who move into permanent housing are entitled to transportation throughout the remainder of the school year, and an additional year, if it is the child's terminal grade in the school.



Students who enroll locally are entitled to transportation comparable to that which their permanently housed peers receive, and the elimination of barriers to enroll and attend school.

McKinney-Vento Act and N.Y. Education Law 3209

Continued transportation to the same school for the rest of the academic year when the student moves into permanent housing, even if the new housing is located outside of the school district

Transportation to extracurricular activities if the lack of transportation would be a barrier to the student participating

The school district where the student is enrolled is responsible for transportation

School Selection for Preschoolers



1. The school that a child attended when permanently housed.



2. The school where the child was last enrolled.




3. The child's new local publicly-funded preschool.



Dispute Process


The McKinney-Vento dispute resolution process is required to resolve any dispute that arises over eligibility, school selection, enrollment in a school, or transportation under the McKinney-Vento Act before a district interrupts services for the student.

42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(1)(C) & 11432(g)(3)(E); U.S. DOE Non-Regulatory Guidance, Questions K-1, K-2; N.Y. Education Law § 3209(5); 8 N.Y.C.R.R. § 100.2(x)(7)(ii)



Dispute Resolution Process

- Parents or unaccompanied youth can file a 310 Appeal with the New York State Commissioner if there is a disagreement with a district's decision about eligibility, enrollment, school selection, or transportation under the McKinney-Vento Act.
 - The child or youth must be immediately enrolled in their desired school and can maintain enrollment, transportation, and other services provided to students in the desired school district pending final resolution of the dispute, including all available appeals.
 - The Commissioner issues a decision on the appeal.







Dispute Resolution Process

Immediately enroll
the student in the
school requested by
the family or youth
and provide
transportation, if
requested

Provide the parent or youth a written notice of district's determination

Continue enrollment and transportation until all appeals are final

Assist the parent or youth with completing all the appeal paperwork

Summary







LEA's Role to Remove Barriers For...



Enrolling

Enroll in school immediately even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment.



Attending

Continue attending the school of origin and receive transportation to and from school.



Succeeding

Equal access to the same free, appropriate public education and related services needed to meet State academic standards





Role of the McKinney-Vento Liaison




IDENTIFICATION

- Identify students who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence.
- Continue eligibility for McKinney-Vento benefits for an unspecified length of time if housing is not fixed, regular, and adequate.



ENROLLMENT

• Assist students with immediate enrollment if admission requirements are met and there are seats available in the charter school.



SUPPORT

- Provide access to resources: health care services, dental services, mental health and substance abuse services, housing services, and other appropriate services.
- Ensure transportation to and from school of origin.
