Identification of Students Experiencing Homelessness

Under the McKinney-Vento Act, the local liaison is charged with ensuring that homeless children and youth are identified by school personnel through outreach and coordination activities with other entities and agencies.

42 U.S.C. § 11432 (g)(6)(A)(i)

Role of the Housing Questionnaire

- Screening tool is required for all students
- Required at the time of enrollment and change of address

NOTE TO SCHOOLS/LEAS: Please assist students and families filling out this form. The form should be included at the top page of registration materials that the district shares with families. Do not simply include this form in the registration packet, because if the student qualifies as residing in temporary housing, the student is not required to submit proof of residency and other required documents that may be part of the registration packet. 

Analyzing Homeless Student Data

Key Steps in analyzing data on students in temporary housing

- 1. Identify important data sources
- 2. Gather relevant data from sources like school records, surveys, and other entities (i.e. Local homeless shelters)
- 3. Analyze the data to identify trends and patterns related to factors like demographics, academic performance, attendance, and access to support services





Analyzing Homeless Student Data

Questions to ask about your district's data on students in temporary housing

- Compare three to five years of data to determine patterns and/or trends. What did you notice? Are the numbers increasing or decreasing?
- What assumptions can you make about the change? What changes do you notice in absenteeism, academic performance, graduation rates?
- Using the observations of the trends, how does your district plan to meet the needs of the students in temporary housing?
