

# McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act

The McKinney-Vento Act states that children and youth who lack "a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence" will be considered homeless.







# **Homelessness: Living Conditions**

- Sharing the housing of others due to loss of housing, economic hardship or a similar reason
- Living in emergency or transitional shelters
- Living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations
- Abandoned in hospitals
- Living in a public or private place not designed for sleeping
- Living in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, etc.
- Migratory children living in circumstances described above
- Unaccompanied youth living in circumstances described above



Education Law §3209(1)(a); 8 NYCRR §100.2(x)(1); see also 42 USC §11434A(2)(B)(i)



# **Eligibility Determination**



Homelessness = lacking a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence.



If any one of these criteria is missing, the student is eligible for McKinney-Vento benefits.



A student may be considered homeless for an unspecified length of time if housing is not fixed, regular and adequate.





# **School Stability**

Stable Environment

Access to Regular Meals



Consistent Adult Attention

Academic Support Positive Peer Relations







Local education agencies (LEAs or school districts) must "presume that keeping homeless children and youth in the school of origin is in the child's or youth's best interest, to the extent feasible, except when doing so is contrary to the wishes of the parent or guardian (or in the case of an unaccompanied homeless youth) the youth."

42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(B)(i), 2001





#### **School Selection**

- School of origin is defined as the school that the child or youth attended when permanently housed or the school in which the child or youth was last enrolled 42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(G).
- Students can continue attending their school of origin the entire time they are homeless and until the end of any academic year in which they become permanently housed 42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(A)(i)(II).
- If a student becomes homeless in between academic years, he or she can continue attending the school of origin for the following school year 42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(A)(i)(I).

A child or youth experiencing homelessness may enroll in any public school that non-homeless students who live in the attendance area in which the child or youth is living are eligible to attend (the local attendance area school) 42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(A)(ii).





# **School of Origin**

The term "school district of origin" shall mean the school district within the state of New York in which the homeless child was attending a public school or preschool on a tuition-free basis or was entitled to attend when circumstances arose which caused such child to become homeless, which is different from the school district of current location.

School district of origin shall also mean the school district in the state of New York in which the child was residing when circumstances arose which caused such child to become homeless if such child was eligible to apply, register, or enroll in public preschool or kindergarten at the time such child became homeless, or the homeless child has a sibling who attends a school in the school district in which the child was residing when circumstances arose which caused such child to become homeless.

# **School Selection: Determining Best Interest**

In determining the best interest of the child or youth, the LEA shall:

- Keep a homeless child or youth in the school of origin, except when doing so is contrary to the wishes of the child's or youth's parent or guardian;
- Provide a written explanation, including a statement regarding the right to appeal, to the homeless child's or youth's parent or guardian, if the local educational agency sends such child or youth to a school other than the school of origin or a school requested by the parent or guardian;
- Ensure that the homeless liaison assists the unaccompanied homeless youth in placement or enrollment decisions and provides notice to such youth of the right to appeal.

42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(B)



Education for Homeless Children and Youth Non-Regulatory Guidance (updated March 2017)



#### **How Does an LEA Determine Best Interest?**

- An LEA must consider student-centered factors related to the child's or youth's best interest, including factors related to the impact of mobility on achievement, education, health, and safety of homeless children and youths, giving priority to the request of the child's or youth's parent or guardian or (in the case of an unaccompanied youth) the youth. [Section 722(g)(3)(B)(ii)].
- An LEA should also consider the school placement of siblings when making this determination.

#### Questions to Consider to Determine Best Interest

- How permanent does the family's current living arrangement appear to be?
- How connected is the student to the current school?
- What are the academic needs of the child?
- How do the programs at the local school compare with the programs at the school located within the district of origin?
- How would the length of commute to and from the school district of origin impact the child?
- Would testing or a significant event at the school be affected by the timing of a school transfer?

# McKinney-Vento Act: School Selection

Parents, guardians, or unaccompanied youth ("the designator") in temporary housing may have choices for school enrollment.

#### They can choose:

- The school attended or was entitled to attend when circumstances arose which caused the child or youth to become homeless.
- The school last enrolled, even if the student was temporarily housed during that time, or
- The local school where the student is currently temporarily housed.
- District participation in a Regional Placement Plan (RPP).

N.Y. Education Law § 3209(1)(c)

# Importance of School Selection

- Impacts academic success, and social and emotional growth
- Maintains educational stability by allowing students experiencing homelessness to remain in school district of origin, when feasible







#### **School Selection Scenario**



A family with a 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> grader were permanently housed and attended school in **District A**. A flood occurs in their home, and they move into a relative's home in **District B**. They are told that it will take six months to repair the damage, so they move into a motel in **District C** in the meantime. Where can the children attend school?

- The school attended when they were last permanently housed — District A.
- The school last entitled to attend, even if the student was temporarily housed during that time. District B
- The local school where the student is currently temporarily housed — District C





# **School Selection for Publicly-Funded Preschool**



The school that a child attended when permanently housed or was entitled to attend when circumstances arose.



The school where the child was last enrolled.



The child's new local publicly-funded preschool.



N.Y. Education Law § 3209(1)(i)



#### **Preschool Scenario**



Pedro's mom was permanently housed in Freeport SD. She then became displaced and is now living in temporary housing in Hempstead SD. She wants to enroll Pedro in a preschool program. Where can she enroll him? There are three choices.

- 1. The school Pedro attended when permanently housed—Freeport SD, or
- 2. The school where the child was last enrolled—Freeport SD, or
- 3. The child's new local District administered preschool—Hempstead SD.

# Step 1: Explain the Rights and Significance of School Selection

- Meet with the parent to discuss best interest and the school selection process.
- Demonstrate empathy and partnership in planning for the best interest of the child/youth.
- Highlight the importance of school stability and parent/guardian wishes.
- Express goals of academic success and support while experiencing living in temporary housing.






# When the Local Attendance School is selected, try these Enrollment Strategies







## Local Attendance School: Enrollment Strategies

#### The **sending school** may:

- Encourage parents to transition at a time that would minimize disruptions;
- Send school records immediately to new school;
- Collect samples of student work to share;
- Connect with liaison at receiving school to ensure immediate enrollment;
- Provide information on the new school. Highlight any special programs and/or activities that could benefit the child.





## Local Attendance School: Enrollment Strategies

#### The **receiving school** may:

- Welcome the student;
- Provide orientation materials and a tour of the school;
- Review student's academic records and discuss needs with the parent/guardian;
- Connect the student with services needed such as free meals, transportation, and tutoring;
- Implement policies and practices to ensure students receive credit even if enrolling mid-semester.





## **Conversations With Parents/Youth**

- 1. Explain the rights and the significance of school selection.
- 2. Assist the parent/guardian/youth in considering options.
- 3. Ensure the students continued instruction in their current school, or a smooth transition to a new school.









LEAs must review and revise laws, regulations, policies, and practices that may act as a barrier to the identification of, or the enrollment, attendance, or success in school of, children and youths experiencing homelessness. These barriers must be addressed in order to ensure that students experiencing homelessness are afforded the same free, appropriate public education as provided to other children and youths [42 U.S.C. § 11431(2)]

## **Immediate Enrollment**

The selected school must immediately enroll the student, even if the child or youth:

- Does not have records normally needed for enrollment.
- Has missed application or enrollment deadlines during any period of homelessness.
  - Enrolling school should contact last school attended for records.
  - Liaison must assist the child/youth in obtaining any necessary immunizations or other required health records.

## **Enrollment**

- Ensure Housing Questionnaire is completed and determine eligibility for McKinney-Vento benefits.
- Complete the STAC 202 form and, if applicable, mail a copy to SED and the District of Origin.
- Determine district and school of attendance.
- Set a time for your next meeting or phone call with the parent/youth.
- Determine the emergency needs of student and family and make the appropriate referrals:
  - School Supplies
  - Personal Care Items
  - Housing Resources
  - Mental Health Care
  - Referral for Early Childhood Education

- Clothing, Shoes, etc.
- Transportation
- Health Care
- Dental Services





## Housing Questionnaire

- Screening tool is required for all students
- Required at the time of enrollment and change of address

NOTE TO SCHOOLS/LEAS: Please assist students and families filling out this form. The form should be included at the top page of registration materials that the district shares with families. Do not simply include this form in the registration packet, because if the student qualifies as residing in temporary housing, the student is not required to submit proof of residency and other required documents that may be part of the registration packet.

## STAC-202: Designation Form

#### Two purposes:

- 1. Official Designation form (complete for every M-V student enrolled in your district and send a copy to the districts listed)
- **2. Eligibility form** for homeless tuition reimbursement

If DSS places a child or youth in a temporary housing facility or RHY facility, DSS must complete the designation form within two days and submit it to the designated school district.

## Communicate With School Staff

Who the McKinney-Vento Liaison notifies on an "as needed basis":

## Student Privacy Rights Under FERPA

- Strategies used by school districts to identify McKinney-Vento students should be grounded in sensitivity and demonstrate a commitment to protecting student confidentiality.
- According to the McKinney-Vento Act, information about the living situation of a child or youth experiencing homelessness is not deemed to be directory information; rather it is considered a student education record and must be provided with the applicable confidentiality protections.
   [42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(G)]







## Role of McKinney-Vento Liaisons



#### **SCHOOL SELECTION**

- Work with parents to select the school that will best meet the needs of the child/youth.
- Maintain attendance at school district of origin for the duration of homelessness, where feasible.
- Maintain school stability to support students' academic and social growth.
- Provide professional learning to school personnel on all aspects of school selection.





## Role of McKinney-Vento Liaisons

#### **ENROLLMENT**





- Enroll the student in the school of origin or the school that is in the best interest of the student.
- Remove any barriers that would prevent child/youth from enrolling and participating fully in school classes and activities.
- Help parents, guardians, and unaccompanied homeless youth obtain required health records, needed immunizations, or health screenings.
